The CAA06M analyzer is the optimal test solution to characterize cell site's infrastructure due to its ease of use and rich functionality.

The CAA06M analyzer has all of the measurement functions necessary to accurately verify the site's transmission line and antenna system from signal reflections (VSWR or Return Loss) to DTF (Distance to Fault) measurement function.

Getting Started

Unpacking and inspecting CAA06M Cable and Antenna Analyzer

VIAVI ships our instruments using anti-static packing material to stabilize the components inside the box. When unpacking the components, verify that all the items you ordered are included in the package. After you unpack the components, you should inspect them for damage. Installing CAA06M Cable and Antenna Analyzer

You need to attach the CAA06M Cable and Antenna Analyzer to your mainframe.

- 1 Power off your mainframe.
- 2 Put the upper hooks of CAA06M into the holes (A) and push it tightly to fit in the rear panel (B).
- 3 Screw the lower part of the module with a flat-head screwdriver.
- 4 Install the dummy module to the connector not in use if you ordered one.
- 5 Power on your mainframe and perform the O-S-L Calibration by tapping the Cal in the right-side bar on the screen. The instrument displays on-screen instructions for you to follow through.




The dummy module is intended to protect the rear connectors (140-pin Edge Card Connector Socket) and it is recommended to install a dummy module for any connector not in use.

For the customer who wants to order the dummy module, the part number is C2K-EMPTYMOD. Each module port's recommended use is for 100 module insertions. If intermittent performance is observed consult VIAVI Technical Support for further assistance.

Setting up the instrument

Enabling software options

You can enable purchased software options by using the Import Options from USB button. Please call the regional VIAVI Solutions Sales Office for more details about enabling options. They will ask you the serial number of the test instrument for which the upgrade or software option was ordered.

Viewing options

Your instrument may come with software options installed or you may order them later and install yourself.

- 1 Select the **System Setting** icon, then select **System Info**.
- 2 The options installed appears in the **Base Options** pane on the right.

Installing software options

- 2 Connect the USB memory stick with option files to the **USB A** or **USB B** port of the instrument.
- 3 In the lower part of the **Base Options** pane, tap the **Import Options from USB** button.
A message alerting the option file is imported appears.

Performing Calibration

Introduction

This chapter provides instructions on how to perform calibration properly in order to obtain accurate measurement results. Topics discussed in this chapter are as follows:

Understanding calibration

Calibration of your instrument to the Open, Short, and Load standards is important to get reliable and accurate measurement results. After setting frequencies and right before making a measurement, you need to perform an O-S-L calibration using a mechanical or electronic calibration kit.

Calibration tools

You need to have the following calibration tools to be able to perform a calibration. This instrument detects the connected calibration kit and displays a different on-screen instruction for it.♣

- Mechanical Y-Cal kit or electronic EZ-Cal kit. **Note.** In case of calibration with Ez-Cal, there is no Cal Off (T)

Performing 1-port Calibration


Measurement modes that need the 1-port calibration are Reflection, DTF, 1 Port Cable Loss, 1 Port Phase and Smith Chart.

It is recommended that you perform an O-S-L calibration right at the RF Out / Reflection port of the instrument without using an extension cable in order to minimize a measurement error. If using an extension cable is inevitable, you need to use a phase stable cable and perform the O-S-L calibration at the end of the extension cable.

O-S-L calibration using mechanical Y-Cal kit

Procedure

- 1 Connect an extension cable, if necessary, to the **Reflection / RF Out** port of the instrument.
- 2 Tap **Cal** icon in the right side bar. The on-screen instruction appears to guide you through the mechanical O-S-L calibration.
- 3 Connect the **OPEN** standard of the calibration kit to the instrument's **Reflection / RF Out** port or to the extension cable if used.
- 4 Tap the **O-S-L** button. The calibration progress bar appears.
- 5 Disconnect the calibration kit and then connect the **SHORT** standard of the calibration kit to the instrument's the **Reflection / RF Out** port or to the extension cable if used.
- 6 Tap the **Continue** button. The calibration progress bar appears.
- 7 Disconnect the calibration kit and then connect the **LOAD** (50 Ω) standard of the calibration kit to the instrument's the **Reflection / RF Out** port or to the extension cable if used.
- 8 Tap the **Continue** button. The calibration progress bar appears.
- 9 Check the screen to see if the calibration status is now changed to **Cal ON**.



O-S-L calibration using electronic EZ-Cal kit

The e-Calibration is an Open-Short-Load calibration using the electronic EZ-Cal kit, which allows you to perform the O-S-L calibration easy and fast with only one connection of the kit to the instrument.



Procedure

- 1 Connect an extension cable, if necessary, to the **Reflection / RF Out** port of the instrument.
- 2 Connect the **EZ-Cal** to the instrument's **Reflection / RF Out** port or to the extension cable if used.
- 3 Connect the USB cable to the side of the **EZ-Cal** and then to the **USB Host** port to power the e-calibration kit.
- 4 Tap **Cal** icon in the right side bar. The on-screen instruction appears to guide you through the e-calibration.
- 5 Tap the **Continue** button. The calibration progress bar appears.

- 6 Check the screen to see if the calibration status is now changed to **Cal ON**.
- 7 After the electronic calibration has been completed, the EZ-Cal kit changes its status back to Open.
- 8 Make sure to disconnect the EZ-Cal kit including its USB connection.

Instrument Configuration

- 01 Check the connection as illustrated.
- 02 Press the O-S-L button to start calibration.
A progress bar is displayed to show the calibration progress in percentage.



Quick calibration



The Quick calibration that is available only in the DTF measurement mode is useful when you want to measure the cable length only, without having to perform a full calibration. It's only valid only for a DTF measurement in the single layout. If you change the display mode to others, calibration status goes back to the previous one.

Procedure

- 1 Connect an extension cable, if necessary, to the **Reflection / RF Out** port of the instrument.
- 2 Tap **Cal** icon in the right side bar. The on-screen instruction appears containing the **Quick Cal** button.
- 3 Connect the **OPEN** standard of the calibration kit to the instrument's the **Reflection / RF Out** port or to the extension cable if used.
- 4 Tap the **Quick Cal** button. The calibration progress bar appears.
- 5 Check the screen to see if the calibration status is now changed to **Cal ON (Q)**.

Instrument Configuration

- 01 Connect the Open connector of the CAL kit to the RF Out/Reflection port or the other end of an extension cable as illustrated.
- 02 Press the O-S-L or Quick Cal button to start calibration. A progress bar is displayed to show the calibration progress in percentage.



Performing 2-port Calibration

For 2 Port Transmission measurement mode that needs the 2-port calibration, you must perform the mechanical or electronic O-S-L calibration and then the Thru calibration after setting the frequency and the output power.

Below figure illustrates a connection setup for Thru calibration only. Prior to this Thru calibration, you must perform O-S-L calibration as described in the previous pages.


Thru calibration

Procedure

- 1 Connect the test cable to the **Reflection / RF Out** port and **RF In** port of the instrument.
- 2 Tap **Thru Cal** to start calibration. A progress bar is displayed to show the calibration progress in percentage.
- 3 Check the screen to see if the calibration status is now changed to **Cal ON**.

Instrument Configuration

- 01 Connect the test port cables between the RF Out/Reference and RF In as illustrated.
- 02 Press the Thru Cal button to start calibration. A progress bar is displayed to show the calibration progress in percentage.



Reflection Test

Introduction

This chapter provides instructions on how to perform Reflection measurements in VSWR or Return Loss. Topics discussed in this chapter are as follows:

- Introducing reflection measurements
- Preparing for a measurement
- Making a measurement

Introducing reflection measurement

Reflection measurements in VSWR or Return Loss are used to characterize cable and antenna system in order to ensure a cell site's impedance matching and signal reflection characteristics.

A proper RF emission in cell sites is achieved with a maximum power transfer from the transmitter to the antenna, where all the transmission media should have an impedance match. A mismatch at the antenna system produces a reflective 'traveling wave' that goes in the opposite direction from the incident wave. As the two traveling waves cross each other in opposite direction, it produces an interference pattern called a "standing wave". VSWR is the ratio between the power that is sent forward to the cable and/or antenna and the amount of the power that is reflected back to the transmitter.

Some of the consequences of having a high VSWR condition in cellular services are dropped calls, poor reception, and an overall unacceptable performance in the cell (or section of cell) coverage covered by the base station antenna. Therefore, the VSWR of the antenna system including the feed line is one of the most critical factors in the service and maintenance of the RF transmitter systems.

VSWR

In telecommunications, standing wave ratio (SWR) is the ratio of the amplitude of a partial standing wave at its maximum amplitude and at its minimum, in an electrical transmission line. The SWR is usually defined as a voltage ratio called the VSWR, for voltage standing wave ratio. For example, the VSWR value 1.2:1 denotes the maximum standing wave amplitude that is 1.2 times greater than the minimum standing wave value.

Return loss

In telecommunications, return loss is a measure of power reflected from imperfections in an electrical or optical communication link. The ratio (PR / PT) , represents the wave power reflected from the imperfection (PR) to that of the incident, or transmitted, wave, (PT). For maximum transmitted power, the return loss should be as small as possible, meaning the ratio PR / PT should be as small as possible.

Return loss is usually expressed in dB and the return loss value describes the reduction in the amplitude of the reflected energy, as compared to the forward energy. It will always be a loss and therefore a negative dB. However, you can write -3 dB simply as 3 dB of loss, dropping the negative sign and adding loss. For example, if a device has 15 dB of return loss, the reflected energy from that device (PR), is always 15 dB lower than the transmitted energy (PT). When expressed in dB, larger (in magnitude) negative numbers represent larger return losses and thus smaller reflected power (PR).


In electrical systems, return losses often occur at junctions between transmission lines and terminating impedances. It is a measure of the dissimilarity between impedances in metallic transmission lines and loads. For devices that are not perfect transmission lines or purely resistive loads, the return loss value varies with the frequency of the transmitted signal.



NOTE

You can also view reflection measurements in Smith Chart to help you graphically identify problems with transmission lines.

Preparing for a measurement

Selecting measurement mode

- 1 Tap **Single** under the **Mode & Measure**.
- 2 Double-tap the **Reflection VSWR** () or **Reflection Return Loss** () icon as needed.



NOTE

You can choose two measurement modes from each window in the **Horizontal** or **Vertical** tab if you want to view dual measurements displayed on one screen.

Setting parameters

Frequency

You can manually set a frequency band to be measured by entering start and stop frequencies or center and span frequencies. You can also select a frequency band from the band list stored in the instrument. It is desirable to set the frequency to a value that covers a normal range of the measurement with enough margins.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Frequency**.
- 2 Input the values of **Start Frequency**, **Stop Frequency**, **Center Frequency**, **Span Frequency** using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Apply**.
- 3 To select a band:
 - a Tap the **Band List** then it displays a list of standard bands stored in the instrument and custom bands created in the JDViewer.
 - b Tap your choice from the list.
 - c Tap the **Apply** button on the Band List box. The instrument automatically updates the values of the **Start Frequency** and **Stop Frequency** according to the selected band.



NOTE

Frequency changes after calibration affect the calibration status. If changed within the registered bands, the status turns into CAL ON (I) and it does not require re-calibration. If changed off the registered band, the status turns into CAL OFF and it requires re-calibration.

Amplitude

You can set maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale manually by setting the Top and Bottom amplitudes or restore the instrument's default full scale defined for each measurement mode. You can also optimize the Y-scale automatically so that an entire trace can be displayed on the measurement chart. Adjusting Y-scale does not affect calibration status.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Amplitude**.
- 2 Input the values of **Top** and **Bottom** amplitudes using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Apply**. The entered values become the maximum and minimum values for the Y-scale.
- 3 To restore the instrument's default range for the Y-scale, tap **Full Scale**. The amplitude range for the **Reflection** mode is **1 to 65 in VSWR** and **-60 to 0 dB in Return Loss**.



NOTE

You can also tap **AUTO SCALE**() any time you need to view the entire trace on the measurement chart. The instrument automatically optimizes the maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale to display the entire trace.

General parameters

You can select options for Data Points, Interference Rejection, and Bias Tee.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **General**.
- 2 To set the measurement resolution, select the **Data Points** option from the choices: **126**, **251**, **501**, **1001** and **2001**.



NOTE

Default setting is 1001. It is recommended that you select high resolution data points only for an instance of measuring wide frequency bands or requiring precise measurement data.

The larger number you choose, the higher resolution you get and the longer the instrument takes to sweep and display results. 




Reflection VSWR measurement screen (single layout)




Reflection VSWR measurement screen (zoom zones)




Reflection VSWR & DTF return loss measurement screen (horizontal layout)

Introducing DTF measurements


While VSWR is an indicator to express the efficiency of the cell site's energy transmission, DTF is a measurement to identify the fault locations in the antenna line system. Most of the antenna line system consists of various types of coaxial cables, connectors, and devices such as dividers and surge arrestors.

Since VSWR is a measurement to verify the impedance discontinuity of the total feed line system, it is necessary to perform DTF measurement to identify the exact component that is contributing to the performance degradation of the line system. The DTF measurement makes it easy to identify the fault location by displaying the relative distance of the signal reflections or discontinuities from various points of the transmission system.

In DTF measurements, the instrument transmits a test signal along the conductor or transmission medium. If the conductor is of uniform impedance and properly terminated, the entire transmitted signal will be absorbed in the far-end termination and no signal will be reflected toward the instrument. Any impedance discontinuities will cause some of the incident signal to be sent back towards the source.

Higher impedance creates a reflection that reinforces the original signal whilst lower impedance creates a reflection that opposes the original signal. The resulting reflected signal that is measured at the output/input to the instrument is displayed or plotted as a function of time and, because the speed of signal propagation is relatively constant for a given transmission medium, it can be read as a function of cable length or distance location. Because of this sensitivity to impedance variations, the instrument may be used to verify cable impedance characteristics, splice and connector locations and associated losses, and estimate cable lengths or faulty location.

- 4 To set the method of video filtering to display the trace, select the **Windowing** option from the following choices: **Rectangular, Blackman, Nominal Side, Low Side** and **Minimum Side**.

**NOTE**

If the video filtering is activated by selecting a different type of Windowing filters, Rectangular or Blackman, the overshoots of the trace are reduced by smoothing out the sharp transitions so that you can easily discriminate noises and peaks. For example, if you select the Blackman, noises around peaks are reduced and it helps you verify a DTF location clearly.

- 5 To change the display unit for distance, select the **Unit** option from the choices: **Meter** and **Foot**.

**NOTE**

Setting your city and time zone automatically changes not only the date and time but also the distance unit in the DTF settings accordingly to Meter or Foot.



- 2 Connect an antenna or feed line to the calibration point, which is usually at the extension cable end if used.
- 3 Your measurement result is displayed on the screen in real time.

**CAUTION**

Do not apply or connect power exceeding +30 dBm to the **Reflection / RF Out** port. When the input signal power is greater than +30 dBm, it may cause a damage to the CAA module and instrument.


**NOTE**

Do not change the connected port extension cable or frequency settings, or it may cause a measurement error.



2-Port Transmission Testing

Introduction

This chapter provides instructions on how to perform the 2-Port Transmission measurement. It is used to quantify signal gain or loss in a cable or other devices with connecting both ends of the cable or device to the instrument. Topics discussed in this chapter are as follows:

Introducing 2-port transmission measurement

The 2 Port Transmission measures the level of the signal attenuation of passive RF elements such as cables and filters, or the level of gains of active RF elements such as amplifiers. The frequency band to measure the characteristics of a cable must be calibrated before performing the insertion loss/gain measurement.

Gain

The gain is the gain resulting from the insertion of a device in a transmission line, expressed as the ratio of the signal power delivered to that part of the line following the device to the signal power delivered to that same part before insertion.


Insertion loss

The insertion loss is the loss of the transmitted signal power resulting from the insertion of a device in a transmission line. It is usually expressed relative to the signal power delivered to that same part before insertion. In most systems, insertion loss is introduced by things such as connectors, splitters, or couplers.

The insertion loss of a device (which may be a whole line) may also be referred to as attenuation. Line terminations play an important part in the insertion loss because they reflect some of the power. Apart from this, it is clear that not all of the power that is sent in to the line at one end appears at the other. This is because of radiation losses, resistive losses in the conductor as well as losses in the surrounding dielectric. The loss resulted from inserting a transmission line between a source and a load is called the insertion loss of the line.

If the power transmitted by the source is P_T and the power received by the load is P_R , then the insertion loss is given by P_R divided by P_T . For maximum power transfer the insertion loss should be as small as possible. In other words, the ratio P_R/P_T should be as close to one as possible, which in decibels means as close to 0 dB as possible.

Preparing for a measurement

Selecting measurement mode

- 1 Tap **Single** under the **Mode & Measure**.
- 2 Double-tap the **2 Port Transmission** () icon.



NOTE

You can choose two measurement modes from each window in the **Horizontal** or **Vertical** tab if you want to view dual measurements displayed on one screen.

Setting parameters

Frequency

You can manually set a frequency band to be measured by entering start and stop frequencies or center and span frequencies. You can also select a frequency band from the band list stored in the instrument. It is desirable to set the frequency to a value that covers a normal range of the measurement with enough margins.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Frequency**.
- 2 Input the values of **Start Frequency**, **Stop Frequency**, **Center Frequency**, **Span Frequency** using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Apply**.
- 3 To select a band:
 - a Tap the **Band List** then it displays a list of standard bands stored in the instrument and custom bands created in the JDViewer.
 - b Tap your choice from the list.
 - c Tap the **Apply** button on the Band List box. The instrument automatically updates the values of the **Start Frequency** and **Stop Frequency** according to the selected band.



NOTE

Frequency changes after calibration affect the calibration status. If changed within the registered bands, the status turns into CAL ON (I) and it does not require re-calibration. If changed off the registered band, the status turns into CAL OFF and it requires re-calibration.

Amplitude

You can set maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale manually by setting the Top and Bottom amplitudes or restore the instrument's default full scale defined for each measurement mode. You can also optimize the Y-scale automatically so that an entire trace can be displayed on the measurement chart. Adjusting Y-scale does not affect calibration status.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Amplitude**.
- 2 Input the values of **Top** and **Bottom** amplitudes using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Apply**. The entered values become the maximum and minimum values for the Y-scale.
- 3 To restore the instrument's default range for the Y-scale, tap **Full Scale**. The amplitude range for this measurement mode is **-120 to 100 dB**.



NOTE

You can also tap **Auto Scale**() any time you need to view the entire trace on the measurement chart. The instrument automatically optimizes the

maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale to display the entire trace and the limit.

General parameters

You can select options for Data Points, Interference Rejection, and Bias Tee.

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **General**.
- 2 To set the measurement resolution, select the **Data Points** option from the choices: **126**, **251**, **501**, **1001** and **2001**.



NOTE

Default setting is 1001. It is recommended that you select high resolution data points only for an instance of measuring wide frequency bands or requiring precise measurement data.

The larger number you choose, the higher resolution you get and the longer the instrument takes to sweep and display results. For example, selecting 501 data points provides twice as many measurement points as 251, but it may take twice longer to sweep and display the trace than choosing 251 data points. Changing data points does not affect calibration status.

- 3 You can choose the **Output Power** between **-30 dBm** and **5 dBm** by 1 dB step.



NOTE

Changing the output power level after calibration affects the calibration status and it requires you to perform a new calibration.

- 4 To set the number of measurements to be averaged, tap **Average** and enter a value between 1 and 100.

- 5 To enable the **Interference Rejection** feature, select **On**.



NOTE

Default setting is **Off**. It is recommended to use this feature only when you suspect interfering signals in the area as it slows down measurement.

- 6 *For users with the Bias Tee installed.* To use the Bias Tee, Select **On** for the **Bias Voltage** and input a value between **12** and **30** with 1 V step, as you desire. Tap **Apply** to save the changes.



NOTE

If you have set this **Bias Voltage** to **On**, the instrument will supply a DC bias of set level (12 – 30 V) from the **SMA** port to an external bias-tee device.

Performing calibration

Perform the O-S-L-Thru Calibration by tapping the **Cal** icon in the right side bar. The instrument displays on-screen instructions for you to follow through.

Making a measurement

Once the O-S-L calibration is done, the instrument is now ready to make a measurement.

Procedure

- 1 Disconnect the calibrated extension cable from the **Reflection / RF Out** port of the instrument.
- 2 Connect your DUT between the extension cable and the **Reflection / RF Out** port.
- 3 Your measurement result is displayed on the screen in real time.




NOTE

Do not change the connected port extension cable or frequency settings, or it may cause a measurement error.



Selecting measurement mode

- 1 Tap **Single** under the **Mode & Measure**.
- 2 Double-tap the **RF Source** () icon.



NOTE

You can choose two measurement modes from each window in the **Horizontal** or **Vertical** tab if you want to view dual measurements displayed on one screen.

Turning on RF source

You can turn on the RF Source feature to generate a CW signal of different output power levels.

- 1 Tap **Frequency box** and input a value within the frequency range of your instrument between **12.5 MHz and 6 GHz** by using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Apply**.
- 2 To set the output level of the CW signal to be injected, tap **Power Level box** and enter a value within the output range for the frequency you have set between **-30 dBm and 10 dBm**.
- 3 To start generating the set signal, tap **RF Source oval** to green. To stop generating the signal, tap **RF Source oval** to gray.


Introducing CAA Check measurement

CAA Check is a standard feature that you can use on CAA06M Cable and Antenna Analyzer. It enables you to create and run task systematically as defined in the testing sequence with minimal manual work and intervention.

You can create a configuration profile for routine and repetitive testing beforehand in this CAA Check mode and reuse the file to achieve the following:

- Reduced testing time and workload
- Systematic, automatic, and reliable testing with minimal manual work
- Consistent and reliable test results from any technicians with different skill level

Preparing for a measurement

Selecting measurement mode

- 1 Tap **Single** under the **Mode**.



- 2 Double-tap the **CAA Check** () icon. Once tapped, the CAA Check landing page appears.



NOTE

CAA Check is only available in **Single** tab and viewing dual measurement display is not available.

Adding a task

You can create tasks to be tested by tapping the **Get Started** button in the **Create Profile** pane on the right.

The CAA Check lets you create a user-defined task, edit, move, and delete tasks easily using the icons below.

	Move down	Tap to move the added task down.
	Move up	Tap to move the added task up.
	Edit	Tap to undo copy, cut, or select. The default setting is greyed out and it is only activated when copy and cut is performed.

- 1 Tap the **Add** button to add a task for testing.
The Add Task pop-up window appears with each measurement.
- 2 Tap to select a measurement you want to test.
- 3 Tap the **Close** button to apply your choice.
- 4 *Optional.* Tap to switch the **Troubleshooting** to on (green) or off (gray).
You can add Troubleshooting under the selected task as a sub-task.

**NOTE**

You can add several troubleshooting steps under the parent task and it only works when the parent task fails. Once finished troubleshooting, go back to your parent task.

Setting a test

Once you add a task, you will see three tabs, Parameter, Prompt, and Actions to be set on the right pane.

Setting parameters

Cable

You can select a cable from the list of cable names stored in the instrument.

- 1 Tap **Cable Name** and select a cable from the cable list pop-up window.
The instrument automatically changes the Propagation Velocity and Cable Loss values correspondent to the selected cable's propagation velocity and cable loss. Default setting is HFC-12D (1/2").
- 2 Tap the **Propagation Velocity** and enter a value using the on-screen keyboard.
- 3 Tap the **Apply** button.

**NOTE**

Cable setting is available when you add a task for DTF VSWR or DTF Return Loss.

Frequency

You can manually set a frequency band to be measured by entering start and stop frequencies. It is desirable to set the frequency to a value that covers a normal range of the measurement with enough margins.

- 1 Input the values of **Start Frequency** and **Stop Frequency** using the on-screen keyboard.
- 2 Tap the **Apply** button.

Distance

You can manually set start and stop distance to be measured by entering start and stop distances. The maximum measurable distance is dependent on the frequency you set. You can set any values within the maximum measurable distance, but optimum resolution is achieved when you set the distance same as the maximum measurable distance.

- 1 Input the values of **Start Distance** and **Stop Distance** using the on-screen keyboard.
- 2 Tap the **Apply** button.

**NOTE**

Distance setting is available when you add a task for DTF VSWR or DTF Return Loss.

Amplitude

You can set maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale manually by setting the Top and Bottom amplitudes or restore the instrument's default full scale defined for each measurement mode. You can also optimize the Y-scale automatically so that an entire trace can be displayed on the measurement chart. Adjusting Y-scale does not affect calibration status.

- 1 Input the values of **Top** and **Bottom** amplitudes using the on-screen keyboard.
- 2 Tap the **Apply**.
The entered values become the maximum and minimum values for the Y-scale.

Limit

The Limit Line is a straight horizontal line that you can enable to analyze your measurement results.

- 1 Tap **Limit Value** and enter a pass/fail threshold value using on-screen keyboard.
- 2 Tap the **Apply** button.
- 3 Tap **Limit Line** to select **On**.

The green limit line appears at the set value on the screen in case of pass.

- 4 Tap **Warning Value** to set the warning threshold and enter a threshold value using on-screen keyboard.
- 5 Tap the **Apply** button.
- 6 Tap **Warning Line** to select **On**.

The warning line appears at the set value on the screen.

Setting prompt

If you want to prompt a message on the measurement screen while running a test, you can select a prompt from the following three options.

- 1 **None** is no prompt message pops up while testing when selected.
- 2 **Connect 50 Ω LOAD at the end of DUT** is a default prompt and it pops up while testing when selected.
- 3 **Connect SHORT or OPEN at the end of DUT is prompted while testing when selected.**
- 4 **Custom** is a user-customized prompt that pops-up while testing when selected. You can also attach images on demand.

Setting actions

You can set actions for a test as the following:

- 1 Tap **New** or **Current if valid** for **Calibration**.
Tap **New** if you want a new OSL calibration, or tap **Current if valid**.
- 2 Tap to select a marker position.
You can easily find a peaks or valley on the trace, 4 peaks or valleys, and peak or valley between two markers.
 - **None**: Searches no peak or valley
 - **Peak**: Searches for the highest peak on the trace

- **4 Peaks:** Searches for four peaks with four Normal markers from M1 to M4 regardless of the previous marker setting
 - **Valley:** Searches for the lowest peak (valley) on the trace
 - **4 Valleys:** Searches for four valleys with four Normal markers from M1 to M4 regardless of the previous marker setting
- 3 Tap to select **Scale** from the three options.
- **Full:** Restores the instrument default scale defined for each measurement mode
 - **Auto:** Views entire trace on the measurement chart. The instrument automatically optimizes the maximum and minimum values of the Y-scale to display the entire trace and the limit
 - **Keep amplitude settings:** Keeps the instrument amplitude settings as it is.

Saving results from a task

You can specify a file name so that the instrument can automatically save results after running the task.


- 1 Tap the **File Name** field.
On-screen keyboard pops-up to enter a file name.
- 2 Input a file name using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Enter**.
- 3 Tap to select a **File Type** from **Trace**, **Screen**, or **CSV** on demand.

Saving a profile

Once you set all the parameters for a test, you can save it as a profile file.

- 1 Tap **Save Profile** at the bottom of the screen in the middle.
- 2 Tap the **File Name** field.
On-screen keyboard pops-up to enter a file name.
- 3 Input a file name using the on-screen keyboard and tap **Enter**.
- 4 Tap the **Save** button.
If you have saved a file with the same name, a pop-up message appears asking you to save the file name as it is or with a timestamp (YYYY-MM-DD HH:MM:SS).

Loading a profile

You can directly create a new profile or load your saved profile before running a test. If you have any saved profiles in your instrument, you can load one by tapping the **Get Started** button in the Load Profile pane on the left.

The CAA Check lets you create a user-defined folder, select, copy, cut, paste, and delete profile files saved in the internal memory or in your USB memory drive. You can manage your profile files using the icons below.

	Select	Tap the Folder () icon to open the files or folders you want to select. Tap to select files or folders.
	New	Tap to create a new folder. Once tapped, the on-screen keyboard pops up and enter any folder name that you want to create.

- 3 You will be directed to **Run Test** page.
If you want to test, refer to [Running a test](#) and start testing.

Running a test

Once you have saved a profile file, you can run a test.

- 1 Tap **Run Test**.
A table which shows a list of tasks, summary, status, retest and result appears.
- 2 Tap the **Start** button to start testing.
All the added tasks are tested and you will see the number of tasks in progress with elapsed time.
- 3 Tap the **Stop** button to stop testing.
If Stop is tapped, the testing will be stopped and the **Continue** and **Re-start** buttons appear.
- 4 *Optional.* Tap **Continue** to continue the stopped test or **Re-start** to start the testing from the first beginning.



NOTE

If you move to Home, Test Setting, or Save Profile in the middle of running a test, a pop-up message appears. Tap the **No** button to move without saving a report or tap the **Yes** button to move to Report and save it.

Using zoom zones

User-definable zones on frequency sub-bands enable visual identification of uplink and downlink frequencies for compliance verification with a single measurement window.

You can use the Zoom function to have a closer look at the user-definable zoom zones in different windows up to four zones. All the four zoom zones are turned off by default. It is available for Reflection, 1 Port Cable Loss, 1 Port Phase and 2 Port Transmission measurement in the single layout view.


Setting sub-band frequency

- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Zoom**.
- 2 To enable a zoom zone, select **On** in the **Zone [1|2|3|4]** pane.
- 3 Input the start and stop frequencies for each zoom zone by touching zone start and stop frequency boxes.
- 4 To disable a zoom zone, select **Off** for the zoom zone.

Tips for zoom zones

- 1 The top half of the screen shows the chart with the trace for the full O-S-L calibration band while the bottom half of the screen displays zoom zones that you have enabled in the Zoom setting.
- 2 Individual zoom zones on the screen are independent from one other. Function keys correspond only with the selected zone, which is called as the "active" chart with outside borders surrounded.

Using alternate DTF band

You can use the **Alt DTF Band** that is available only in DTF measurements after a calibration to scale down of a specific sub-band without a need of an additional calibration.

Two independent sweeps can be performed, for example, one Reflection measurement and the other DTF measurement.

Setting alternate DTF band


- 1 Tap the **Menu** () key on the side bar and tap **Alt DTF Band**. If you have dual displays on the screen, make sure to select a DTF measurement display for which you like to set. The alternate DTF band setting window appears.
- 2 Select **On** for the **Alt DTF Band** to enable or **Off** to disable. Input the values of **Start Frequency**, **Stop Frequency**, **Center Frequency**, **Span Frequency** using the on-screen keyboard.

**NOTE**

Minimum value for the Alternate Span is 2% of what you have set for the Span in the Frequency/Distance tab.

- 3 Input the **Start Distance** and **Stop Distance**.
- 4 The text "Alt DTF Band: On" appears at the top left corner of the DTF measurement plot.

Using markers


You can have up to six markers on the measurement display simultaneously. The instrument displays the Marker menu in the side-bar on the screen. As you set a marker on the trace, you can see readouts of each marker position that is displayed in its marker screen key on the Marker screen menu bar.

A colorful marker indicates that the marker is the active marker now and you can manipulate it as you like including changing marker type or setting the marker off. The measurement display carries the active marker's position readouts at the top right corner on the display.

Setting a marker

- 1 Tap the marker menu () on the side bar.
- 2 Tap one of the six marker screen keys (M1 to M6), which you like to position on the trace. The active marker's readout is displayed on the screen as shown in below screen capture.
- 3 To change the active marker type, tap the marker number screen key and then select the marker type option from the following choices:
 - **Normal:** A Normal marker provides the reading of a marker position on the trace along with the marker number set between 1 and 6. When you select a marker screen key, the Normal marker type is set by default.
 - **Delta:** A Delta marker is associated with a Normal marker. A Normal marker must be set before a Delta marker is set. When the Delta marker is set, the position set by the Delta marker becomes the reference position of the normal marker and the marker's X and Y values display the difference compared with the Delta marker. The reference position will be fixed. This setting is not used in the Smith Chart measurement mode.
 - **Delta Pair:** A Delta Pair marker is associated with a Normal marker. A Normal marker must be set before a Delta Pair marker is set. When the Delta Pair marker is set, the position set by the Delta Pair marker becomes the reference position of the Normal marker and the marker's X and Y values display the difference compared with the Delta Pair marker. The reference position will vary as the trace changes. This setting is not used in the Smith Chart measurement mode.
- 4 Repeat the steps 2-3 to set more markers as needed. If there are two or more markers on the trace, you can change the active marker.
- 5 To set a marker as the active marker, simply tap the marker screen key. The color of the text in the marker's screen key changes from grey to blue to indicate the active marker.

Active marker and its readout



Moving, hiding, and clearing a marker

- 1 To move the active marker, do one of the following:
 - a Tap a new position on the trace. The active marker jumps to the new position on the active trace.
 - b Tap a new marker in the marker table below. The active marker moves directly to the specified position on the active trace
- 2 To hide the active marker, complete the following steps:
 - a Tap the active marker on the screen and tap the **Marker** to **Off**. To have the marker back on the screen, tap the **Marker** to **On**.



NOTE

The instrument keeps the last status of marker type and position internally so that you can have the marker back on the trace with the previous information when you select Marker On in the same measurement mode.

- 3 To clear all the markers displayed on the chart:
 - a Tap any marker screen key that has marker properties.
 - b Tap **Marker Clear All** and all the existing markers disappear and their marker properties are deleted.

Searching for peak or valley

You can easily find a peaks or valley on the trace, 4 peaks or valleys, and peak or valley between two markers. When a zoom zone is selected, you will have a different set of menus.

Finding a peak or valley

- 1 Tap the peak search menu, () on the side bar.
- 2 Select one of the Peak screen keys to do tasks as needed, from the following choices:
 - **Peak:** Searches for the highest peak on the trace.
 - **Next Peak:** Searches for the second highest peak on the trace.
 - **Next Peak Left:** Searches for the highest peak to the left from the current position.
 - **Next Peak Right:** Searches for the highest peak to the right from the current position.
 - **Valley:** Searches for the lowest peak (valley) on the trace.
 - **Find 4 Peaks/Valleys:** Searches for four peaks or valleys with four Normal markers from M1 to M4 regardless of the previous marker setting. If you tap the **Find 4 Peaks/Valleys**, the **Always Peak/Valley** automatically changes to Off.
 - **Always Peak/Valley:** Searches for the highest peak or valley on the trace automatically every time the trace is refreshed.
 - **Peak/Valley Between 1:** Searches for the highest peak or valley in between M1 and M2 and automatically assigns M5 if there are M1 and M2 on the trace.
 - **Peak/Valley Between 2:** Searches for the highest peak or valley in between M3 and M4 and automatically assigns M6 if there are M3 and M4 on the trace.

Finding a peak or valley in zoom zones

- 1 After selecting any of the zoom zones enabled on the screen, tap the peak menu, lower **M** on the side bar for the zoom zones.
- 2 Same choices as above (**Peak** to **Peak/Valley Between 2**) for each zoom zone are supported.

Displaying traces

You can write, capture, and load to 6 traces on the measurement display simultaneously.

Adding a trace

- 1 Tap **Trace** in the **Menu** () key on the side bar. By default, the instrument sets the first trace, **Trace 1** on and displays "T1 W".
- 2 Tap one of the six traces (**Trace 1 to Trace 6**), which you want to set, and tap to **Trace View On**.
- 3 Do one of the options from the following choices:
 - **Clear Write**: Clears current data and writes new measurement.
 - **Capture**: Captures the active trace to compare with other trace(s).
 - **Load**: Loads and overlays a saved trace to do comparison analysis of up to 4 traces by superimposing them on one measurement display.



NOTE

The trace(s) to be overlaid must have the same measurement mode and frequency settings as the current measurement. For the DTF mode, the stop distance setting must be equal or shorter than the one of the current measurement.

- **Trace View On**: Displays the turned-off trace back on the chart.
 - **Trace View Off**: Hides the active trace.
- 4 Repeat the steps 2-3 to set more traces as needed.
 - 5 To clear all the traces displayed on the chart:
 - a Tap any **Trace** you want to choose.
 - b Tap **Trace Clear All**. Then all the existing traces disappear and the default trace T1 is displayed with measurements.

Performing trace math

If you have the traces T1 and T2 on your measurement chart, you can perform trace arithmetic functions.

- 1 Tap **Trace** and select either **Trace 1** or **Trace 2** trace.
- 2 Tap **Trace Math Type** and do one of the trace math functions from the following choices:
 - a **T1+T2**: Adds the traces T1 and T2 and displays the result.
 - b **T1-T2**: Subtracts the trace T2 from the trace T1 and displays the result.
 - c **T1*T2**: Multiplies the traces T1 and T2 and displays the result.
 - d **T1/T2**: Divides the trace T1 by the trace T2 and displays the result.

The Trace Math window appears in the lower half of the screen.



NOTE

Trace math is not available in the DTF and Smith Chart modes.


- To turn off the trace math function, tap **Trace Math Type** to **Off**.

Loading a saved trace

You can load a saved trace whenever you need. Unlike the trace overlay, the display layout mode changes to the single display and measurement settings such as measurement mode and X and Y scales are restored as saved.

- To load a save trace, see “**Performing Save and Load**” in Operation book.
- To dismiss the loaded trace data, tap **No Overlay Exit** screen key. Your current measurement appears back on the screen.

NOTE

You can set the Subframe No. from 0 to 9 and Slot No. between 0 and 1 based on your need using the on-screen keyboard.

Setting test limits

You can define test limits for automatic Pass/Fail and Warning indication and display a limit line with single or multiple segments or a limit window. It makes it easy to verify that a measurement exceeds defined thresholds with alarming option, which sounds if any portion of the trace falls outside the limit settings.

Setting a limit line

The Limit Line is a straight horizontal line that you can enable to analyze your measurement results.

- 1 Tap **Limit** in the **Menu** () key on the side bar.
- 2 Select the **Alarm Sound** option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument goes off an alarm when a result falls outside of defined limits.
- 3 Select the **Pass/Fail** result option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument displays “PASS” or “FAIL” result on the screen.
- 4 Tap **Limit Line** and tap **Limit Value** on screen below.
 - a Enter a pass/fail threshold value using on-screen keyboard.
 - b Tap **Limit Line** to select **On**. The green limit line appears at the set value on the screen in case of pass.
- 5 *Optional.* If you have enabled the pass/fail limit line, you can display a warning line.
 - a To set the warning threshold, tap **Warning Value** and enter a threshold value using on-screen keyboard.
 - b Tap **Warning Line** to select **On**.

The warning line appears at the set value on the screen.

- 6 *Optional.* To save the limit settings, tap **Save** ().


Setting a Multi Segment limit Line

The Multi-Segment limit Line (**MSL**) is a mask you can define and use to analyze your measurement results.

- 1 Tap **Limit** in the **Menu** () key on the side bar.
- 2 Select the **Alarm Sound** option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument goes off an alarm when a result falls outside of defined limits.
- 3 Select the **Pass/Fail** result option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument displays “PASS” or “FAIL” result on the screen.

- 4 Tap **Multi Segment Line** and **Upper/Lower** to select **Upper** or **Lower** as desired.
 - 5 To set the number of segments for the **MSL**, tap **Segments**. Enter a value between **1** and **50** using on-screen keyboard.
 - 6 Tap **Auto Set** for the instrument to automatically set values for the **MSL** segment(s).
 - 7 Tap **Display** and select **On** to display the MSL line.
 - 8 To edit each segment of the **MSL**:
 - a Tap Segment Edit and arrow. The red point indicates your current selection.
 - b To select a point to redefine the frequency or amplitude value, tap **Move MSL** and arrow.
 - c Do the following as needed:
 - To change the X-axis coordinate of the point, tap **Frequency** and enter a value using the on-screen keyboard.
 - To change the Y-axis coordinate of the point, tap **Amplitude** and enter a value using the on-screen keyboard.
 - To add a new segment, tap **Segments** and input the number of segment you want.
 - 9 To move the current MSL line, tap **Move MSL** and enter a value by using the on-screen keyboard.
- Optional: To save the limit settings, tap **Save** ().

Upper and lower MSL line




MSL line with red point



Setting a limit window

- 1 Tap **Limit** in the **Menu** () key on the side bar.
- 2 Select the **Alarm Sound** option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument goes off an alarm when a result falls outside of defined limits.
- 3 Select the **Pass/Fail** result option between **On** and **Off**. If you select **On**, the instrument displays “PASS” or “FAIL” result on the screen.
- 4 Tap **Limit Window** and **Limit Window On/Off** to select **On**. The green limit line appears at the set value on the screen.
- 5 To edit the frequency or amplitude value of the limit window segments, complete the following steps:
 - a Tap **Move**. The red point indicates your current selection.
 - b To select a point to redefine the frequency or amplitude value, tap the arrow of **Move**. Each time you tap this key, the selection moves to right or left.
 - c To change the X-axis coordinate of the point, tap **Frequency / Distance** and enter a value using the on-screen keyboard.
 - d To change the Y-axis coordinate of the point, tap **Amplitude** and enter a value using the on-screen keyboard.
 - e *Optional:* To save the limit settings, tap **Save** ().

Holding a measurement

You can put a measurement on hold and resume sweeping as needed.

- 1 Tap **Hold** () icon on the side bar. Sweeping is paused.
- 2 To resume the measurement, tap **Hold** () icon again. Sweeping is continued.
